"Standing Room Only" Crowd for First Anacostia Waterfront Forum

On February 17th, the District Department of Transportation (DDOT) sponsored the first Anacostia Waterfront Forum at the Martin Luther King, Jr. Library. A standing-room-only crowd of over 200 people filled the east wing of the library's Great Hall for the 90-minute forum. The topic was "Sustainable Development Infrastructure and the Future of the District of Columbia."

Following welcoming remarks from acting DDOT Director Gabe Klein, a three-member panel responded to a presentation by Kathleen Linehan Penney, Chief Engineer of the District's Department of Transportation. Penney's presentation focused on how investments in Anacostia Waterfront infrastructure should provide the foundation for social, economic and environmental progress in District and waterfront neighborhoods, especially those east of the Anacostia River.

"To be sure, infrastructure problems in the District are not limited to the Anacostia Waterfront," Penney said. "But I contend that more than any other place, it is the infrastructure problems and lack of investment on the Anacostia Waterfront that most severely decrease the likelihood that the District will become a more inclusive and sustainable city in the 21st century. It is time to invest our resources and time in the waterfront and the surrounding neighborhoods."

The invited respondents to Penney's presentation were Charles Wilson, President, Historic Anacostia Block Association; Uwe Brandes, Vice President for Innovation, Urban Land Institute; and Walter Smith, Executive Director, DC Appleseed Center for Law and Justice.

The Anacostia Waterfront Forum is a series of monthly public presentations to be held every third Tuesday through June 2009, designed to bring voices from different neighborhoods together to receive accurate and timely information about the waterfront and its current state of transformation and revitalization.

The forum series is an activity of the Anacostia Waterfront Civic Engagement Program, a multi-agency program responsible for building a constituency to achieve the goals of the Anacostia Waterfront Framework Plan.

Alice Rivlin Champions Stimulus Funds for DC Infrastructure Projects

Alice Rivlin of the Brookings Institution and Walter Smith of the DC Appleseed Center for Law and Justice are among the influential voices in Washington urging President Obama to "seize the opportunity to transform the nation's capital into a truly great capital city" with his infrastructure-focused stimulus plan. In a Washington Post commentary that appeared on February 1st, Rivlin and Smith pointed to the immediate benefit of much-needed jobs for District residents. In a new study, "Building the Best Capital City in the World", they make the case for the District's ailing transportation system, citing the 11th Street bridges project as 'shovel ready' and integral to shuttling the city's federal workforce across the Anacostia River. Smith, who is the executive director of the Appleseed Center for Law and Justice, was a panelist at the first Anacostia Waterfront Forum on Feb. 17.
